President's Report 2016-2016

I am pleased to announce the *Michigan Philharmonic's* 71st season was a great success! And our free summer concert series, reaching the four corners of the Detroit metro area and downtown, is officially a staple of for many communities and concert goers! The season treated audiences to beloved favorites, such as the Holiday Pops and Halloween concerts along with innovative performances which included culturally diverse programming, stunning classical arrangements and pops performances. There was truly something for everyone!

None of it would be possible without our extraordinary and innovative Music Director and Conductor, Nan Washburn, who completed her 18th year with the orchestra. The musicianship of this professional orchestra under her leadership continues to gain local, regional and national attention. And to that end, congratulations are in order once again for Ms. Washburn and the Michigan Philharmonic musicians. *Nan Washburn and the Michigan Philharmonic were selected as the winner of The American Prize - Ernst Bacon Memorial Award for the Performance of American Music, 2016-17, in the professional division.* Another outstanding achievement indeed!

As we think of our past, present and future, we remain committed to the three pillars of our orchestra:

- Innovative Classical Music Programming
- Education for People of All Ages
- Geographic Enrichment through Community Engagement

Efforts to expand the geographic reach of the orchestra continue. The Michigan Philharmonic is a yearlong staple in many communities through our renowned summer concert series, special performances and education programs. We are proud to say the metro Detroit area embraces the orchestra that the Plymouth community calls its own!

Total revenue last season was nearly \$483,000, which is a 12% increase over the prior year. Total admissions were down \$8k compared to the previous season. However, there were three fewer concerts in the series. Per concert revenue increased by nearly 24%, due in large part to increasing awareness of the orchestra, greater outreach and more flexible season ticket options.

Individual and business donations decreased by \$29,000 combined, while grants increased by \$43,000. The largest area of growth came through what is known as "contract services". Revenue from these arrangements nearly doubled compared to the prior season. These are concerts where the Michigan Philharmonic contracts with area organizations and communities for performances at venues throughout the metropolitan area. These concerts are beneficial for the orchestra and support the three pillars outlined previously, because they present little financial risk to the organization while supporting community engagement and access to innovative programming.

In continuation of our focus on sustainability, Michigan Philharmonic's staff, Board and volunteers are working diligently to expand the donor base by hosting various events intended to build relationships with current and future patrons and stakeholders. Attendance and funding for the Michigan Phil from these events continues to grow at a steady pace. Relative to our education pillar, the Michigan Philharmonic's Education Program continues to expand and revenue associated with these programs increased 40% year over year. Lastly, judicious expense management has and will continue to be a tenet of the orchestra. Given all of these factors, I am pleased to report the orchestra ended the fiscal year with net income of approximately \$60k, achieving our goal of erasing the negative equity position on the balance sheet.

The 72nd season promises to be filled with compelling and innovative performances, just what audiences have come to expect from Ms. Washburn and her talented musicians! Concert attendance continues to

grow and audiences appreciate the variety of exciting musical experiences the Michigan Philharmonic delivers. While the orchestra expands its reach, the CLASSical Music Education Outreach and Composer in Me Programs continue to provide outstanding music opportunities for students in the Plymouth-Canton, Wayne-Westland and other Downriver schools. The *Michigan Philharmonic Youth Orchestra,* with over 115 students, continues to grow in size and stature, impressing audiences throughout the region.

Our organization relies heavily on its outstanding Board of Directors. In that vein, we welcome Gail Grieger and Kathleen (Kathy) Ruble to our Board and officially welcome the return of Pam Hall, who rejoined during last season. Ms. Grieger is a Plymouth resident, with a background in law. Currently, she heads the operations of the PARC facility which is the office location of the Michigan Philharmonic. In addition to her Board contributions, she and Don Soenen are working diligently to make the dream of a performing arts center on the site of PARC a reality. The Michigan Philharmonic has long desired a performing arts home and with their vision, guidance and tenacity, it is closer to becoming a reality. Ms. Ruble is a resident of Northville. Her appreciation of music comes from firsthand experience as a violinist. Kathy is accomplished in her career as well. She is an Executive with Ally Financial and works to support the advancement of women in leadership roles. Ms. Hall lives in Northville and served on the Board previously. We are grateful for her return. In addition to her contributions to the Michigan Philharmonic, Pam is a successful mortgage banker. While we are excited about our new and returning Directors, we must also thank Brian Chermside and Kim Crouch for their service to the Michigan Philharmonic as they depart from the Board. We appreciate their contributions over the past several years and will miss their insights and professional acumen. And, please join me in formally welcoming our new President, Chris Belcher. Chris has served on our Board since 2011 and been a member of our Executive Committee as Secretary and President-elect since 2014. Chris will continue to advance our goal of sustainability through our three pillars. He is an accomplished professional whose experience, knowledge and character will be of great benefit to the future of the Michigan Philharmonic. Welcome Chris! On behalf of the entire Michigan Philharmonic organization and stakeholders, we are grateful for your leadership. Last but certainly not least, our Board of Directors is one of the finest anywhere. This talented group of professionals continues to be instrumental in guiding the organization to new heights. You can be confident that Nan Washburn, Music Director; Beth Stewart, Executive Director; Narendra Sheth, Vice-President; Ron Frechen, Treasurer; Pam Hall, Secretary; and the rest of the Board, talented musicians, staff and volunteers will do a tremendous job this coming year. We are fortunate to have such a gifted team.

As we kick off our 72nd season, we invite you to join us as we continue **Orchestrating the Extraordinary!**

Music Director's Report

The Michigan Philharmonic's 71st season may not have been quite the scale and scope of our 70th anniversary last year but it was, as all our seasons are, exciting, action-packed and loads of fun. Through it all, we enjoyed performances of classical favorites, explored many brand new works and discovered some wonderful little-known musical gems.

Here are the 2016-2017 season's artistic highlights:

Artistic recognition:

- A huge honor for us this year! The Michigan Philharmonic and I received The American Prize Ernst Bacon Memorial Award in the Performance of American Music. Not only did we come away with 1st place in the award's inaugural year, but we were also competing with many other types of music groups, including opera companies and new music ensembles, in addition to other orchestras.
- WRCJ 90.9 FM again aired three of our performances this season: Philharmonic Fright Night (Oct.), Miniature Masterpieces (Jan.) and Phil-Palooza (April 1). It is fabulous to be acknowledged for our performance excellence in this way, especially since we are among only a handful of prestigious organizations including DSO, MOT and Ann Arbor Symphony regularly being broadcast on this public radio station.

Special tribute to Women Composers:

- While we have for the past 18 years performed many works by women composers (61 different pieces by 43 composers), we decided to make a bigger deal about this accomplishment during our 2016-17 season by celebrating our six featured women composers.
- In addition, we held several fun and informative "women composer" events throughout the season that included presentations by:
 - Katherine Hoover (Oct. 6)
 - o Nan Washburn (Nov. 16)
 - o Jessica Hunt (Jan. 26)
 - Alice Gomez (March 30)

Guest Soloists:

- Flute virtuoso and U of M Music Professor, Amy Porter opened our season with a powerhouse performance of Katherine Hoover's new *Four Winds Concerto* (Oct. 8).
- We hosted probably the most unusual soloist we've ever presented with ukulele player extraordinaire, Jim Beloff
 playing his own concerto. He even topped it off with a delightful encore called "Charles Ives."
- Michigan Phil's principal violist, Mircea Cure stepped out to solo on our Holiday concert, performing Telemann's *Viola Concerto* and Leroy Anderson's zippy perpetual-motion *Fiddle-Faddle* (Dec. 15).
- Violinist Joseph Deller, our fantastic concertmaster, got us all feeling "A Touch of the Irish" with his toe-tapping rendition of *The Fiddler in All of Us* by Daniel Kingman (March 5).
- Randy Bhirdo, recently retired traffic reporter for WWJ Radio (for our Plymouth performance, April 1) and Dave Wagner, Program Director & Host for WRCJ FM (for our Brighton performance, April 8) were terrific narrators of Prokofiev's musical story, *Peter and the Wolf*.
- As the season grand finale, the Plymouth Community Band, Carl Battishill, director, joined us in creating an ensemble of over 110 musicians for unforgettable performances of Shostakovich's *Festive Overture* and John Williams' Star *Wars* (April 1).

We are fortunate that Hektor Qyteti, who has been the conductor of both MPYO Strings and Sinfonia, agreed to take over as MPYO's new Artistic Director, as we welcome Joanna Goldstein to the MPYO staff to direct the flute choir and hopefully help us start a new wind ensemble.

Thank you to all our board members, staff, musicians and volunteers for all your hard work and continued support of the Michigan Philharmonic. We are one fabulous team!

Executive Director's Report Season 71 – 2016-2017

Now firmly established as one of the premier organizations in the Plymouth Arts & Recreation Complex, the Michigan Philharmonic completed a very busy season of concerts and activities.

Performances and Outreach:

The outreach of the Michigan Philharmonic continues to grow at a fast pace. In 2016-17 we performed free summer concerts in downtown Plymouth, Kensington Metropark, Stoney Creek Metropark, and Downtown Detroit at Campus Martius while adding successful concert programs in Taylor and Brighton. The Michigan Philharmonic performed 8 regular season concerts with 8 repeats in Brighton, Northville and Taylor along with 6 performances of our Koncert for Kids. Our Michigan Phil Brass Quintet performed at the Tiger game for Star Wars Night for the fourth year in a row – we could never afford to pay for this kind of advertising! Sadly, not long after this performance we lost one of our own. Glenn Anderson, who played trombone with the orchestra for over 15 years. Glenn was a great musician and a great teacher and many of our MPYO students studied with him.





Community Engagement:

With a focus on the works of women composers, the Michigan Phil hosted a series of program highlighting women in music. Programs with Katherine Hoover, Nan Washburn, Lost Voices, Jessica Hunt and Alice Gomex brought people together to learn more about historical and contemporary women composers and their challenges and successes.



Multi-cultural Programming:

On the multi-cultural front we performed our 8th Bollywood concert with our friends at the Geetmala Foundation and Narendra Sheth and our Michigan Phil String Quintet performed with International Oud sensation, Rahim AlHaj, for Global Fridays at Arab American Museum.

Education:

Our educational programs also continue to shine and bring notoriety to our organization. In



2016-17 our Michigan Philharmonic Youth Orchestra grew to 115 students in 4 different

ensembles! We increased the number of educational concerts for elementary students –thanks to continued funding and collaborations we added our full CLASSical Music Outreach program to Taylor schools and Van Buren schools in addition to the Plymouth Canton Schools. With these three districts and performances of our Koncerts for Kids for all 4th graders in Romulus schools and Heritage Academy in Flat Rock we reached over nearly 6000 3rd and 4th graders. Our work with the Arts Academy at the PCEP has also increased and our visiting composers are always a "hit" with the students in the Academy.

We keep our Conductor, Nan Washburn, very busy and she continues to program exceptional music for each and every concert, bringing in exciting guest artists and composers. We also keep our musicians very busy and we are proud of their hard work and their commitment to the Michigan Philharmonic and the growth we have experienced. Our Board of Directors has worked tirelessly to make sure the backbone of our organization is solid with the strategic planning and funding to continue to make the Michigan Philharmonic one of the elite performing organizations in the State of Michigan.

Treasurer's Report

The accounting policies of the Michigan Philharmonic conform to generally accepted accounting principles. Revenue through public support and grants is recognized when contributed or unconditionally promised and revenue for admissions, contract services and other is recognized when earned. Contributions that are restricted by the donor are reported as increases in temporarily or permanently restricted net assets depending on the nature of the restrictions. When a restriction expires temporarily restricted net assets are reclassified to unrestricted net assets.

The Michigan Philharmonic is a not-for-profit Michigan corporation recognized as exempt from Federal Income Taxes pursuant to Section 501 (c) 3 of the Internal Revenue Code. The Philharmonic is exempt from Michigan Sales and Use Tax in accordance with P.A. 167 of 1933 and P. A. 94 of 1937, both as amended.

Total revenue for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2017 was \$497,704 compared to \$421,980 for the prior year. Total expenses net of other income amounted to \$436,724 resulting in an excess of revenues over expenditures of \$60,980 compared to minus \$51,039 for the prior year.

Admissions amounted to \$71,684 with earned income comprising 38% of total income. Annual Giving amounted to \$181,580.

The Michigan Philharmonic was successful in obtaining grant awards during the fiscal year totaling \$55,369. For the previous year grant income totaled \$77,300.

Michigan Philharmonic Education Programs 2016-2017

The Michigan Philharmonic is dedicated to being "The Education Symphony" for students of all ages, from elementary school to seniors. Nan Washburn, conductor of the Michigan Philharmonic, is Artistic Director for all of our education programs. She also has been the conductor of our Youth Orchestra and Flute Choir. Michigan Philharmonic violinist, Hektor Qyteti, conducted the STRINGS and Sinfonia. Jane Libbing is the Education Coordinator and Youth Orchestra Manager.

CLASSical Music Outreach

The CLASSical Music Outreach to the schools Program is a joint venture of the Plymouth-Canton Community Schools Elementary Music Teachers and the Michigan Philharmonic. Spearheaded by Board member Luan Brownlee and then Board Pres. Don Soenen, it was created to support numerous academic and music curriculum goals. During the 2016-2017 school year, students from four school districts and one private school participated in this musical jewel.

The Michigan Philharmonic's Education Quintet shared their knowledge, talent and inspiration with third graders during 45 minute instrument demonstrations in the Plymouth-Canton, Taylor, and VanBuren School districts, and Plymouth Christian Academy. They introduced the instruments of the orchestra and the science dealing with how they make their sounds. The children are also treated to individual and group performances.

The focus for the fourth graders is on the concert experience itself. The roles of the conductor and concert master, how and why they warm up, how to know when to clap and concert etiquette are among the things the children learned. They were also introduced to the music they would be hearing at the Koncert for Kids a few weeks later. In addition to the schools mentioned above, the fourth graders from the Romulus Community Schools were bussed to nearby locations to for their 45-minute performance of the Koncert for Kids in May. This year, 4173 children took part in these 3rd and 4th grade programs.

The Michigan Philharmonic continues to be a source of visits to the Plymouth-Canton High School Arts Academy by outstanding professional musicians and composers in town to be featured in Michigan Philharmonic concerts.

Michigan Philharmonic Youth Orchestra (MPYO)

Students from 13 different communities across SE Michigan spent Tuesday evenings practicing and performing in one or more of the Michigan Philharmonic Youth Orchestra ensembles. During the 2016-2017 season. their 125 members came from public, private parochial and home school programs. A number of these young musicians volunteered to perform for various community groups in Plymouth, Canton, Wayne and downtown Detroit.

The MPYO had four ensembles this year: the STRINGS for string players who can read music and have had at least one year of playing experience, the SINFONIA, for intermediate string players who are shifting 3 octaves and have had ensemble experience, the YOUTH ORCHESTRA our most advanced ensemble, with strings, woodwinds, brass and percussion, and the FLUTE CHOIR for intermediate and advanced flute students. Our December and

May concerts were performed in the Village Theater at Cherry Hill in Canton, Michigan. The Sinfonia played side-by-side with the Michigan Phil in Nov. and the Youth Orchestra had

their side-side concert with the Michigan Philharmonic in the spring. Our MPYO June Pops Concert in Kellogg Park is always a favorite. Nurturing their exposure to and experience playing many kinds of music in a variety of settings is one of our goals.

Annual Report – Marketing

Social Media

This past year the Michigan Philharmonic has been working strategically to develop and reach out to a more diverse audience while retaining our traditional core of supporters. The most significant growth in marketing efforts has been in our social media presence. We have targeted new audience through the use of Facebook, Instagram and Twitter. Through these three major social media platforms we have been able to create an online presence while engaging with new patrons. Twitter has nursed the development of new partnerships with other organizations such as the MetroParks and Culture Source.

We are trying to move from an event-centered mindset to a content development mindset. We will be sharing more information to our audience, 'from come to me to going to you'. This strategy will hopefully help engage more audience, online presence and conversions.

In these different platforms, we have made great progress in creating a more engaging process. Although the progress certainly has been slow, it has been steady. As much as the industry focuses on quantity, we have been focusing on a steady growth that secures a more engaging social media audience. The numbers have increased while we have captivated an audience that keeps coming back to our posts, comments and concerts. An example of this is a patron who made a comment on our Facebook page in another language, we responded to her in her language and she brought a large group of more than 10 people to one of our summer concerts. Later on, she became a subscriber.

Lecture Series

Community engagement is a key element of our organization. While we have been able to maintain and serve our traditional audience, we have also reached out to newer members through community engagement and partnerships, as well as a dynamic lineup of artistic endeavors.

This past season we dedicated our efforts to convey how we have always been in the forefront of innovative programming by subtlety programming more women composers. Our Music Director and Conductor Nan Washburn has been programming music composed by women for many years and we have never made it a "theme" of how important and unique this programming has been because the focus is on bringing the great music. As of this past season, Michigan Philharmonic has programmed 61 works by 43 women composers.

Our four Lecture Series featured Katherine Hoover, Nan Washburn talks Women Composers, Jessica Hunt and Alice Gómez, presented different perspectives in the business of composing and featuring music made by Women from history as well as the most contemporary composers. This series captivated an audience who truly enjoyed and valued the importance of music.

Challenges

The Michigan Phil has accomplished many things this past year, however, we have many areas in which to grow. Funding capability is always a great challenge and technology seems to keep us on the slow track. Additionally, the orchestra does not have its own dedicated orchestra hall makes it difficult to consolidate a supporters base. The Michigan Philharmonic is very proud of our staff, supporters, audience and volunteers who greatly join efforts to make our events and concerts a great experience for all. There are still many things we would like to accomplish and only with the commitment from our community we can reach success.
